Developing a web site for the band has been discussed with Jim Neist. Mike Rubingh has volunteered to help. Neither were present so item tabled.

Discussion about obtaining new summer shirts. Mary N. volunteered to work on this and will ask a couple band members to help. Everyone would pay for own as in past. Band would purchase a few extras for sit-in musicians.





After doing some research, it appears in the past the Community Band had used the Community Center for their rehearsals and at some point, relocated those practices to the Community Center.

Board Policy #830 Community Use of School Facilities – Including the Irvin L. Young Community Center may be used by the youth of the district, school-related organizations, and responsible community groups as prescribed by this school board policy. As a member of the community under section (b) of Who May Use, the Community Band is considered a group which may utilize the facilities. There is a Rental Fee Schedule under section (c) of Assignment of Rental Fees or Other Charges. Use of the high school / middle school band room falls within the fee schedule under "CLASSROOMS" and has a fee of \$10.00 per time used. The Curriculum & Policy Committee reviewed this policy at the last meeting and have decided to keep the policy as it is written.

At this time, as District Administrator, I feel it would be appropriate to waive the fee for the use of the high school / middle school band room by the Community Band for the 2009/2010 school year. If you have any concerns or comments, please feel free to contact me.
